**Session Title: A Changing Forest** 

**Summary:** Throughout the seasons, and throughout the decades, forests change dramatically over time. Whether

species dominance shifts or phenological (seasonal) timing changes, the forest of today may not resemble the forest of tomorrow. Learn more about how you can teach your students to make phenology observations and track seasonal changes with the trees in your community. You will learn how to use Nature's Notebook to record phenology observations. A portion of the workshop will feature new forest disturbance modeling activities. The workshop will introduce teachers to different forest disturbance models, drawing upon research from The Morton Arboretum's forest ecology program, and as part of a new unit developed by the Learning Partnership. Teachers will receive guidance on implementing this unit, which prompts students to investigate why oaks may be shifting away from the dominant forest species in our region and how different management strategies may or may not work to mitigate these shifts in the future. All activities and content are aligned to Next Generation Science Standards, and the workshop is

geared towards educators of grades 6 through 12.

Summary: Media literacy skills have become essential for young people to successfully navigate and critically assess

the ever-increasing amount of information they receive throughout their day - on social media,

advertisements, television, and film. Therefore, it is crucial for students to comprehend and identify how media, both historically and in contemporary society, can be used as a tool to incite hate and violence against certain groups. This learning opportunity examines the events of the Holocaust through the lens of media, by examining propaganda deployed by the Nazis to discriminate against Jews and other minorities. Educators will gain the tools to facilitate classroom discussions on the role and impact of Nazi propaganda

Session Title: Before, During and After a Mental Health Hospitalization - A Teacher's Guide to a

**Trauma-Informed Classroom** 

**Summary:** Teachers: Would you like to learn more about supporting the students in your classroom who have suffered

from trauma, or who have been hospitalized for a mental illness? A mental health hospitalization is a major event in a young person's life, and it can mark the turning point for future success, especially when that person is surrounded by a supportive and engaged community. Teachers are an integral part of that community. This presentation will give classroom teachers ways to support students who have been hospitalized for mental health issues and/or who are victims of trauma. In this two-part presentation, given by teachers from Linden Oaks Hospital, part one of the presentation will focus on what is happening with your students when they are in a hospital, ways to communicate with this student and their families, and how to manage expectations and coursework for the student while they are gone and once they return to class. Part two will focus on what trauma is, how it affects learning and behavior, and covers a range of strategies, ideas, and activities that support building a safe and supportive classroom, regardless of subject

or age level.

Session Title: Blast From the Past: Witness Trees of Illinois

Summary: Discover the special place witness trees have in the history of Illinois. Used by surveyors in the early 1800s,

witness, or "bearing" trees, were sought out as landmarks for creating the earliest state land surveys and plat maps. Some of these trees are still standing today and can be used as a lens to bridge the gap between science and social studies, as well as connect us to our past. Join educators at St. James Farm in Warrenville where science and history converge. Through a variety of activities, learn the role these trees played in the urbanization of Illinois, why they are still important today, and how oak trees are critical to local ecosystems. Then complete a STEM-based learning project to catalog potential witness trees. Take ideas back to the classroom to get your students engaged in similar data collection projects at school. Major portions of this program will be outdoors, and participants should dress for the weather. Please bring

your own lunch.
